


UPTHROWN STONE



Upthrown Stone

One of a founder of Béla Balázs Studio, director and cinematographer Sándor Sára's first feature film is an extraordinary modernist production and autobiographical work from the Hungarian new wave. Balázs Pásztor's father is innocently imprisoned in the 50s, while Balázs is rejected by the University of Film when he applies to study directing. Working as a land surveyor during the communist collectivisation, he attempts to organise a farm base with a Greek partisan couple, who are eventually killed by farm workers. Sára works with long, geometrical stills to portray suffering and the absurdity of the age.

"The Upthrown Stone, which doesn't always avoid the traps of aestheticism with its highly composite imagery and its serial zoom-in effects, is no less a generously enthralling work for it, successfully demonstrating the deeply held devotion of its author for the downtrodden; the sequence where Roma people are shaven and disinfected manages to be deeply wrenching in its soberness and when the hero returns to the town with pictures of his experiences held in a large jar, you are left with a feeling of unparalleled bitterness in the face of a past where human dignity was completely disregarded. The Upthrown Stone is no doubt the work of a highly sensitive artist."
